The University Greys

"The University Greys were Company A of the 11th Mississippi Infantry Regiment during the War Between the States. Part of the Army of Northern Virginia, the Greys served in many of the most famous and bloody battles of the War. Their name "University Greys" derived from the gray color of the men's uniforms and from the fact that almost all of the Greys were students (and faculty) at the University of Mississippi. Nearly the entire student body (135 men) enlisted; only four students reported for classes in fall 1861—so few that the university closed temporarily.



The most famous engagement of the University Greys was in July 1863 at Pickett's Charge during the Battle of Gettysburg, when the Confederates made a desperate frontal assault atop Cemetery Ridge. The Greys penetrated further into the Union position than any other unit, but at the terrible cost of sustaining 100% casualties. Every soldier was either killed or wounded." •

In the coming year, please keep up the good work you have done awarding Crosses. We are losing our World War II, Korean, and Viet Nam veterans. As much as I enjoy giving medals posthumously, I love giving them to living veterans even more. There are still living veterans out there.

Now to a little housekeeping.

- Please submit the applications to me six to eight weeks before the date you plan to bestow the medal. Things do happen, and I would like each recipient to receive their medal on time.
- Please DO NOT use abbreviations, especially for the applicant's service unit. A list of the abbreviations is in the Recorder's Manual.
- If the Confederate ancestor was a prisoner of war, his service did not end because he was in a prisoner of war camp. His term of service ended when he was paroled.



Jeremiah Saunders Gage

Of the University Greys

Jeremiah Saunders Gage from Holmes County, Mississippi, is historically one of the best-known members of Company A, 11th Regiment, Mississippi known as the University Nicknamed "Jere" by friends and family, Gage was from Holmes County, Mississippi. He enlisted on April 26, 1861, at Oxford, Mississippi, as a private, at the age of twenty-one. He had been a student up to that point at the University of Mississippi, having graduated in the class of 1860 but continuing to study law in 1861. He rose to 2nd corporal on September 13, 1861, and soon was appointed 4th sergeant. He was wounded in June 1862 and hospitalized until late 1862, by which time he had been appointed 2nd sergeant. He was killed at Gettysburg on July 3, 1863, and buried on the battlefield until reinterred in Richmond. He is best known for the letter he wrote to his mother during the four hours he suffered after receiving his mortal wounds.

The doctor who attended Jeremiah Gage prior to his death wrote,

The first to arrive, borne on a litter, was a princely fellow and favored son of the Eleventh Mississippi. I saw in an instant a condition of terrible shock. He laid back the blanket and exposed his lower abdomen, torn through left to right by a cannon shot. Without the slightest change of voice, he asked, "Doctor, how long have I to live?" "A very few hours," I replied. darling mother," he said. "Quick, I want to After finishing his letter, he said, "Doctor, I'm in great agony. Let me die easy." I handed him a cup of black drop, a concentrated dose of opium. feebly waved the cup, saying "Come around, boys, and let us have a toast. I drink the toast to you, to the Southern Confederacy, and to victory!" In about an hour, passing hastily, I lifted the cover from his face to find him sleeping painlessly.

Jeremiah's letter to his mother reached its destination. In it, he wrote:



"Gettysburg Penn.

July 3rd

My dear Mother, This is the last you may ever hear from me. I have time to tell you that I died like a man. Bear my loss as best you can. Remember that I am true to my country and my greatest regret at dying is that she is not free and that you and my sisters are robbed of my worth whatever that may be. I hope this will reach you and you must not regret that my body can not be obtained. It is a mere matter of form anyhow. This is for my sisters too as I can not write more. Send my dying release to Miss Mary... you know who."

Our Confederate History

MAUDE M. BROWN & THE UNIVERSITY GREYS

Maude Morrow Brown was a University of Mississippi (Ole Miss) senior in 1897 and was a member of the very first annual staff. Under her influence, their first annual was dedicated to Captain William B. Lowry of the **University Greys** and to the spirit of the University Greys.

Maude graduated and met and married an Ole Miss professor. She taught school for a number of years and spent twelve years researching the War Between the States and the University Greys. In 1940, her book *The University Greys* was published.

Maude went on a trip in 1939 to Pennsylvania to visit her daughter Edith and tour the Gettysburg battlefield. Many years later, Edith related the story of that 1939 Gettysburg trip. She said that Maude

rode the train to Reading, Pennsylvania, where Edith and her husband were both teaching at a small college.

On a Sunday during Maude's visit, Edith's husband drove them about eighty miles to the Gettysburg Battlefield. They toured the whole battlefield and then drove to where Pickett's Charge took place, the Brian Barn. This was where the University Greys and the 11th Mississippi advanced to in the charge. Maude knew exactly where it was.

They all got out of the car, and while Edith and her husband talked, Maude wandered off about twenty yards away from them. A few minutes later, Edith looked over at her mother, and tears were streaming down her face. Maude had worked on that book for so long that she felt like she knew those boys. It broke her heart to stand where they had fought and died at Pickett's Charge.

Because of Maude M. Brown's book, the **University Greys**' story has been saved for future generations! •



UNIVERSITY GREYS: "THE YOUNGEST COLONEL IN THE CONFEDER ATE ARMY"



Led by a nineteen year old Captain William B. Lowry, the **University Greys** rode out of Oxford forty-seven soldiers strong on May 1, 1861, following Confederate orders. Their first battle was also the first major skirmish of the war, the Battle at First Manassas or Bull Run. The Greys went on to serve the Confederacy at Second Manassas, Gaines' Mill, Sharpsburg, Gettysburg, the Wilderness, Talley's Mill, Spotsylvania Courthouse, Bethesda Church, Petersburg, and Hatcher's Run. It is said that at Gettysburg they reached the "high watermark of the Confederacy," beyond even the reach of Pickett's men.

Very few Greys survived. Captain William B. Lowry *did* survive the War, but he had terrible wounds that scarred his face. He died in the late 1880s, and his Confederate tombstone is located in Oddfellows Cemetery, Macon, Noxubee County, Mississippi.

During the years he fought for the Confederacy in the **University Greys**, *Richard C. Bridges*' only way to communicate with loved ones was through letters. Recently, his family donated 27 letters written by the Crystal Springs native during his time with the University Greys to the UM Department of Archives and Special Collections. The final letter in the collection was written by the nurse who cared for Bridges. The soldier passed away from a wound sustained in the Battle of the Wilderness in Staunton, Virginia, in June 1864. 

Letter from a Dying Soldier

This is the transcription of a handwritten and blood-stained letter from a dying **University Grey** soldier, John Robert Montgomery, to his father. He beat the odds and survived Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg in July 1863, but was mortally wounded in the Battle of Spotsylvania Court House that took place from May 8-21 in 1864.

Dear Father

Spotsylvania County, Va. May 10th 1864

This is my last letter to you. I went in to battle this evening as Courier for General Heth. I have been struck by a piece of shell and my right shoulder is horribly mangled & I know death is inevitable. I am very weak but I write to you because I know you would be delighted to read a word from your dying son. I know death is near, that I will die far from home and friends of my early youth but I have friends here too who are kind to me. My friend Fairfax will write you at my request and give you the particulars of my death. My grave will be marked so that you may visit it if you desire to do so, but is optionary with you whether you let my remains rest here or in Miss. I would like to rest in the grave yard with my dear mother and brothers but it's a matter of minor importance. Let us all try to reunite in heaven. I pray my God to forgive my sins & feel that his promises are true that he will forgive and save me. Give my love to all my friends my strength fails me. My horse & my equipments will be left for you. Again a long farewell to you. May we meet in heaven.

Carrie was born in 1850 not far from Saltillo, Mississippi. She joined Tupelo Chapter 888 of UDC in 1922 on the record of her Confederate father *W.P. Langley* who served in Co. A of the 33rd Mississippi Regiment. She was very busy in UDC serving on the MS Division Historical Committee in 1924-25, and she was appointed an Honorary MS Division President in 1930. Carrie's great-great-grandson recently inherited several UDC items, including a MS Division pin and a copy of the *Historical Yearbook, Mississippi Division UDC.* 1924-1925 that had belonged to her. There were also handwritten narratives of her experiences as a child during the War Between the States. It is a treasure trove of firsthand Confederate information!

Learning about our UDC history like this expands our appreciation of what these early women did to build upon the foundation of UDC and uphold the memory of our Confederate ancestors. All these items will need to be officially catalogued, carefully preserved, and stored so they can continue to enrich the purpose and goals that we hold dear in UDC!
